If you're wondering why everyone wears orange and black on Wednesdays, it's because Pocatello is Bengal country! The nation's first indoor stadium in college football, Holt Arena is a Pocatello landmark that plays host to football games and various community events throughout the year.



A cultural jewel of the Northwest, ISU's Stephens Performing Arts Center is an acoustically superb, world-class facility that ranks in the nation's top 10 performing arts centers.



History & Culture

Established in 1889, Pocatello was known as the Gateway to the Northwest for its access to the Oregon Trail. Pioneers, gold miners and settlers traveled this historical trail before heading west toward the Snake River. As years passed, stage-coaches, freight lines and the railroad soon took over, turning the Pocatello community into a thriving trade center and transportation junction. Shoshone Chief Pocatello granted the railroad access through the Fort Hall Indian Reservation, thus giving the city its name.



Known as Idaho's official state museum of natural history, the museum brings Idaho's natural and cultural heritage to life. Spend the day learning about anthropology, dinosaurs, earth science and life sciences.









Travel back in time to the 19th-century world of explorers, trappers, fur traders, pioneers, gold seekers and common folk. The Fort Hall Replica displays period lifestyle and replicates one of the northwest's earliest fur trading forts.



Learn about Chief Pocatello at the Shoshone-Bannock Tribal Museum, which showcases tribal history, old photographs, artifacts from the Old Fort Hall and unique beadwork.

CONQUER THE CRAGS

Rock climbers often travel to Pocatello just to scale the Shady Side and Sunny Side of the basalt lava cliffs of Ross Park, located in the heart of the city. Massacre Rocks State Park provides plenty of routes just 37 miles from Pocatello. Whether you aim to compete or spectate, stick around for the Pocatello Pump, the nation's oldest rock-climbing competition, each September.



Whether you're up for a heart-pounding mountain bike ride or a leisurely nature walk, Pocatello is home to more than 1,000 biking, hiking and walking trails. The City Creek Trail System and the Portneuf Greenway are favorites for thrill seekers and relaxers.



Pocatello is home to two 18-hole public courses and one private membership course. Golfers have no trouble finding a beautifully groomed course to challenge their game.

DISC GOLF

Try your arm at disc golf on one of Pocatello's numerous grassy or sagebrush-covered courses in the area, with several of the most popular courses sanctioned by the Professional Disc Golf Association.

SNOW MUCH FUN

The East Fork Mink Creek Nordic Center offers groomed skate and classic ski trails, separate snowshoe trails and a sledding hill. Mink Creek offers seven parking areas and five trails. Find snowmobile trails at Scout Mountain, Garden Creek and South Mink Creek for miles of powder and mountain trails. Pebble Creek Ski Area also provides a variety of intermediate downhill trails.



Come winter, Pocatello's incredible mountains, trails and meadows become covered in snow and provide cross-country skiing, snowshoeing or snowmobiling adventures. Just don't forget your Park 'N' Ski Pass!


Things to Do & See
